Chrismons and Chrismon Patterns

Chrismons are Christmas decorations with Christian symbols on them. They help Christians to remember that Christmas is the celebration of Jesus's birthday. They are often used on <u>Christmas Trees</u> in Churches and Christians

homes.

They were first made by Frances Kipps Spencer at the <u>Ascension</u> <u>Lutheran Church in Danville, Virginia</u>, USA. She also thought of the

word, Chrismon, which is a combination of Christ and monogram (meaning symbol). The idea quickly spread to other churches. It is traditional that Christian groups can make their own Chrismons with their favourite symbols on.

Chrismons are traditionally colored white and gold. White is the liturgical (or Church) color for Christmas and symbolizes that Jesus was pure and perfect. Gold symbolizes His Majesty and Glory.

Below are some symbols that are common Chrismons and what they represent to Christians.

Nurse's Health Corner

National Hand Washing Week (December)

As we prepare for the cold and flu season, many activities exist that can help you and your family stay healthy during the winter months. The number one activity that can reduce the spread of germs is hand washing. Also, **NEVER put a finger in your eyes, nose or mouth!** December 4–10 is National Hand Washing Week, promoting better hand washing or "Hand Hygiene" to adults and children alike. The CDC's (Centers for Disease Control) focuses on proper hand washing to prevent the spread of germs and infectious disease.

Hand washing is like a "do-it-yourself" vaccine:

Wet your hands with clean, running water (warm or cold), turn off the tap, and apply soap.

Lather your hands by rubbing them together with the soap. Be sure to lather the backs of your hands, between your fingers, and under your nails.

Scrub your hands for at least 20 seconds. Need a timer? Hum the "Happy Birthday" song from beginning to end twice.

Rinse your hands well under clean, running water.

Dry your hands using a clean towel or air dry them.

If soap and clean water are not available, use an alcohol-based product.

When should you wash your hands?

Before preparing or eating food

After going to the bathroom

After changing diapers or cleaning up a child who has gone to the bathroom

Before and after tending to someone who is sick

After blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing

After handling an animal or animal waste

After handling garbage

Before and after treating a cut or wound

Cleaning and disinfecting surfaces remove and destroy germs. The bathroom and kitchen are areas that have frequent traffic and should be disinfected frequently. Practicing safe food preparation and handling can prevent the spread of harmful bacteria and germs. Safe food practices include cleaning your hands and surfaces often, separating preparation, cooking and food serving areas to prevent cross contamination, and cooking and storing foods at the appropriate temperatures.

Help you body's immune system be strong by getting your annual flu vaccine. It is not too late to get your flu shot. The vaccine helps your body create antibodies to the flu viruses contained in the vaccine. It can prevent you from getting the flu or decrease the severity if you are exposed to a different flu strain. Realize that many colds and sore throats are caused by viruses. Antibiotics do not help with this type of infection. Be willing to leave the doctor's office without medication if your physician feels the cause is viral and not bacterial. Remember that antibiotics kill good bacteria found in our bodies that actually protect us. If you do receive an antibiotic for a bacterial infection, please use as directed and complete the full course of treatment. Using antibiotics for viral infections and not completing the course of treatment help certain bacteria become resistant to antibiotics through being overexposed to antibiotic treatment.

The Cross symbolizes that Christians believe Jesus Christ died for everyone on a Cross.

The Latin Cross, also sometimes called the Roman Cross. The base of the Cross has three steps that symbolize faith, hope, and love.

The Irish or Celtic Cross is a normal cross with a circle in the middle to symbolize eternity.

The Triumphant Cross represents the earth with the cross on top. It symbolizes Jesus is triumphant over anything we can face in the world.

The Jerusalem Cross was worn by the crusaders going to Jerusalem, in the middle ages. It can symbolize the Four Gospels in the Bible, the spread of the Gospel to the four corners of the earth or the five wounds of Jesus when he died on the cross.

The Anchor Cross reminds Christian's that Jesus is the anchor of their faith.

IHS are the first three letters of 'Christ' in Greek. I've added them on a Cross as it looks more interesting!.

The Fish is one of the oldest Christian symbols. The letters, from the Greek word for fish (ichthus), stand for Jesus (I), Christ (X), God (Q), Son (Y), Savior (S). Some of Jesus' disciples were fishermen.

Alpha and Omega are the first and the last letters of the Greek alphabet. Used together, they are the symbols that Christians believe Jesus is the beginning and end of all things.

The Chi-Rho looks like a 'P' with an 'X' on top of it. These two letters are the first two letters of the Greek word 'Christos' which means Christ.

The Star of David, sometimes called the Star of Creation, is a symbol that Jesus was a Jew and a descendant of King David.

A Five Pointed Star represents the five wounds of Jesus on the cross.

The Nativity Star is the symbol of the Star of Bethlehem or Epiphany, when the Wisemen visited Jesus.

An Eight Pointed Star represents baptism and regeneration.


The Crown is the symbol that Jesus in King. It shows that Christians believe Jesus is ruler over heaven and the earth.

The Shepherd's Crook or Staff remembers that Jesus sometimes called himself a shepherd. It can also represent the shepherds who were the first people told about the birth of Jesus.





Both of these symbols represent the Christian 'Trinity' of God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit. **The Triquerta** is made of three loops making a triangle representing the three parts of the trinity. **The Trefoil** (at the bottom) is three equal circles intertwined to form a whole.






The Lamp and The Candle both represents that Christians believe Jesus in the Light of the World.

The Cup or Chalice is a symbol of the Mass, Eucharist or Communion. It also represents God's forgiveness.

Babe / Manger represents Jesus as a baby at Christmas.

The Lamb is a symbol for Jesus who is sometimes called 'The Lamb of God'.



The Butterfly is a symbol for transformation and the immortal soul.
